PART I | THE GOVERNANCE PROBLEM

Executive Orientation

Governance is not only about approving action, monitoring performance, or reviewing risk.

Governance also depends on the interpretation that makes action appear necessary, proportionate, urgent, or responsible.

A board may receive a complete paper, but the paper may still rest on a weak interpretation. A CEO may provide a confident explanation, but the explanation may still be based on the wrong problem-frame.

A reform may appear necessary because symptoms are visible, while the deeper cause remains misclassified. A stakeholder response may look professionally prepared, but still communicate from an unstable understanding of the issue.

This briefing introduces interpretive governance as a professional concern for CEOs, boards, senior managers, governance professionals, consultants, and institutional decision-makers.

Its central question is: Has the organisation properly interpreted the problem it is governing?

This question matters because every organisational action carries an interpretation into reality. A decision does not only allocate resources or authorise action. It also expresses what the organisation believes the problem is.

If that interpretation is unstable, incomplete, or misclassified, governance may become formally correct while remaining substantively weak.

The purpose of interpretive governance is to strengthen the reasoning that sits beneath action, approval, reporting, communication, and correction.

CORE QUESTION

Before asking whether the organisation is acting, ask: Is it acting on the right interpretation?
